PROPOSED AMENDMENT HB 1635 # 2

DIGEST

Student immunizations. Specifies that only the general assembly (rather than the Indiana department of health) may expand or modify the list of communicable diseases that require documentation of immunity for a student.

1	Page 7, between lines 12 and 13, begin a new paragraph and insert:
2	"SECTION 9. IC 20-34-4-2, AS AMENDED BY P.L.208-2015,
3	SECTION 12, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
4	JULY 1, 2023]: Sec. 2. (a) Every child residing in Indiana who is
5	enrolled in an accredited elementary school or high school shall be
6	immunized as determined by the state Indiana department of health
7	against:
8	(1) diphtheria;
9	(2) pertussis (whooping cough);
10	(3) tetanus;
11	(4) measles;
12	(5) rubella;
13	(6) poliomyelitis;
14	(7) mumps;
15	(8) varicella;
16	(9) hepatitis A;
17	(10) hepatitis B; and
18	(11) meningitis.
19	(b) The state department of health Only the general assembly may
20	expand or otherwise modify the list of communicable diseases that
21	require documentation of immunity as medical information becomes
22	available that would warrant the expansion or modification in the
23	interest of public health.
24	(c) Before November 30 of each year, the state Indiana department
25	of health shall publish a two (2) year calendar of immunization
26	requirements and recommendations. The calendar must include:

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1	(1) the immunization requirements for the following school year;
2	and
3	(2) recommendations for immunization requirements for the year
4	subsequent to the following school year.
5	(d) The publishing time frame for the calendar described in
6	subsection (c) does not apply in the event of an emergency as
7	determined by the state health commissioner.
8	(e) The state Indiana department of health shall adopt rules under
9	IC 4-22-2 specifying the:
0	(1) required immunizations;
1	(2) child's age for administering each vaccine;
12	(3) adequately immunizing doses; and
13	(4) method of documentation of proof of immunity.".
14	Renumber all SECTIONS consecutively.
