DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 20-34-3.

Synopsis: Prekindergarten vision screening. Requires the governing body of each school corporation to conduct vision testing for prekindergarten children. Allows for the use of electronic eye charts.

HOUSE BILL No. 1159

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning education.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 20-34-3-12, AS AMENDED BY P.L.164-2023,
2	SECTION 52, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3	JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 12. (a) For purposes of this section, "electronic
4	eye chart" means any computerized or other electronic system,
5	device, automated computer program, or method of displaying on
6	an electronic screen medically accepted and properly sized
7	optotypes, including letters, numbers, or symbols, that is used to
8	assess an individual's visual acuity.
9	(a) (b) For purposes of this section, "modified clinical technique"
10	means a battery of vision tests that includes:
11	(1) a visual acuity test to determine an individual's ability to see
12	at various distances;
13	(2) a refractive error test to determine the focusing power of the
14	eye;
15	(3) an ocular health test to determine any external or internal
16	abnormalities of the eye; and
17	(4) a binocular coordination test to determine if the eyes are



1	working together properly.
2	(b) (c) For purposes of this section, "vision screening" means the
3	testing of visual acuity to determine an individual's ability to see at
4	various distances using:
5	(1) the Snellen chart;
6	(2) Sloan letter charts;
7	(3) HOTV letter or LEA symbol charts for younger students; or
8	(4) subject to subsection (m), electronic eye charts; or
9	(4) (5) other technology devices, including photoscreens or
0	autorefractors, for a child who is unable to perform the tests
1	described in subdivisions (1) through (3);
2	at a distance of either ten (10) or twenty (20) feet for distance vision,
3	depending on the calibration of the chart being used, and a distance of
4	fourteen (14) inches for near vision.
5	(c) (d) The modified clinical technique shall be performed by an
6	ophthalmologist licensed as a physician under IC 25-22.5 or an
7	optometrist licensed under IC 25-24.
8	(d) (e) The governing body of each school corporation shall conduct
9	a vision test for each student enrolling in or transferring into:
0.	(1) prekindergarten;

	(2) (3) grade 3;

4	(4) (5) grade 8;
25	and for each student suspected of having a visual defect.
26	(e) (f) The vision test for students in kindergarten and grade 1 shall
27	be conducted using the modified clinical technique unless a waiver is
28	granted under section 13 of this chapter. If a waiver is granted for a
.9	school corporation, the governing body shall conduct a vision screening
0	described in subsection (b) (c) upon each student's enrollment in
1	kindergarten or grade 1.
2	(f) (g) Each student described in subsection $\frac{(d)(2)}{(e)(3)}$, $\frac{(d)(3)}{(e)(3)}$,
3	(e)(4), and (d)(4), (e)(5), and each student suspected of having a visual
4	defect, shall be tested using a vision screening of the student's visual
5	acuity.
6	(g) (h) The following standards apply for a vision screening under
7	subsections (e) (f) and (f): (g):
8	(1) A student in prekindergarten , kindergarten, or grade 1 who
9	is unable to read with each eye the 20/30 line of the Snellen chart
0	or the 20/32 line of the Sloan letters, HOTV, or LEA symbol
-1	optotypes shall be recommended for further examination based
-2	upon the recommendation of the individual performing the



1	screening.
2	(2) A student:
3	(A) in grade 3, grade 5, or grade 8; or
4	(B) suspected of having a visual defect;
5	who is unable to read with each eye the 20/30 line of the Snellen
6	chart or the 20/32 line of the Sloan letters shall be recommended
7	for further examination based upon the recommendation of the
8	individual performing the screening.
9	(3) If a student at any grade level is recommended for further
0	examination, the school must provide a written recommendation
1	for further examination to the parent or legal guardian of the
2	student.
3	(h) (i) Records of all tests shall be made and continuously
4	maintained by the school corporation to provide information useful in
5	protecting, promoting, and maintaining the health of students. The
6	Indiana department of health, in consultation with the state board, shall
7	adopt rules concerning vision testing equipment, qualifications of
8	vision testing personnel, visual screening procedures, and criteria for
9	failure and referral in the screening tests based on accepted medical

5	(k) (l) Not later than October 1 each year, the department shall
6	report for the previous school year:
7	(1) a compilation of the information received from school

9	(2) information received under section 13 of this chapter,

13	(B) the number of waivers approved;
14	(C) the number of waivers denied;

1	this section.
2	(g) The secretary of education shall make and continuously maintain
3	records of all actions taken by the secretary of education concerning all
4	waivers requested under this section.
5	(h) A request for a waiver under this section must be made annually.
