DIGEST OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Military police force. Provides that the military police force may exercise police powers upon the request of a law enforcement agency or the governing body of a unit.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning public safety.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 1-1-4-5, AS AMENDED BY P.L.238-2025,
2 SECTION 1, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3 JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 5. (a) The following definitions apply to the
4 construction of all Indiana statutes, unless the construction is plainly
5 repugnant to the intent of the general assembly or of the context of the
6 statute:
7 (1) "Adult", "of full age", and "person in his majority" mean a
8 person at least eighteen (18) years of age.
9 (2) "Attorney" includes a counselor or other person authorized
10 to appear and represent a party in an action or special
11 proceeding.
12 (3) "Autism" means a neurological condition as described in the
13 most recent edition of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of
14 Mental Disorders of the American Psychiatric Association.
15 (4) "Bond" does not necessarily imply a seal.
16 (5) "Clerk" means the clerk of the court or a person authorized
17 to perform the clerk's duties.
18 (6) "Health record", "hospital record", or "medical record" means
19 written or printed information possessed by a provider (as
20 defined in IC 16-18-2-295) concerning any diagnosis, treatment,

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1 or prognosis of the patient, unless otherwise defined. Except as
2 otherwise provided, the terms include mental health records and
3 drug and alcohol abuse records.

4 (7) "Highway" includes county bridges and state and county
5 roads, unless otherwise expressly provided.

6 (8) "Infant" or "minor" means a person less than eighteen (18)
7 years of age.

8 (9) "Inhabitant" may be construed to mean a resident in any
9 place.

10 (10) "Judgment" means all final orders, decrees, and
11 determinations in an action and all orders upon which executions
12 may issue.

13 (11) "Land", "real estate", and "real property" include lands,
14 tenements, and hereditaments.

15 (12) "Mentally incompetent" means of unsound mind.

16 (13) "Money demands on contract", when used in reference to an
17 action, means an action arising out of contract when the relief
18 demanded is a recovery of money.

19 (14) "Month" means a calendar month, unless otherwise
20 expressed.

21 (15) "Noncode statute" means a statute that is not codified as
22 part of the Indiana Code.

23 (16) "Oath" includes "affirmation", and "to swear" includes to
24 "affirm".

25 (17) "Person" extends to bodies politic and corporate.

26 (18) "Personal property" includes goods, chattels, evidences of
27 debt, and things in action.

28 (19) "Population" has the meaning set forth in IC 1-1-3.5-3.

29 (20) "Preceding" and "following", referring to sections in
30 statutes, mean the sections next preceding or next following that
31 in which the words occur, unless some other section is
32 designated.

33 (21) "Property" includes personal and real property.

34 (22) "Sheriff" means the sheriff of the county or another person
35 authorized to perform sheriff's duties.

36 (23) "State", applied to any one (1) of the United States, includes
37 the District of Columbia and the commonwealths, possessions,
38 states in free association with the United States, and the
39 territories. "United States" includes the District of Columbia and
40 the commonwealths, possessions, states in free association with
41 the United States, and the territories.

42 (24) "Under legal disabilities" includes persons less than

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(25) "Verified", when applied to pleadings, means supported by oath or affirmation in writing.

5 (26) "Will" includes a testament and codicil.

6 (27) "Without relief" in any judgment, contract, execution, or
7 other instrument of writing or record, means without the benefit

(28) "Written" and "in writing" include printing, lithographing, or other mode of representing words and letters. If the written signature of a person is required, the terms mean the proper handwriting of the person or the person's mark.

13 (29) "Year" means a calendar year, unless otherwise expressed.

16 (b) This subsection applies to the definitions of "Hoosier veteran"
17 and "veteran" when used in reference to state programs for veterans.
18 The term "veteran" includes "Hoosier veteran", and applies to the
19 construction of all Indiana statutes, unless the construction is expressly
20 excluded by the terms of the statute, is plainly repugnant to the intent
21 of the general assembly or of the context of the statute, or is
22 inconsistent with federal law. "Hoosier veteran" means an individual
23 who meets the following criteria:

24 (1) The individual is a resident of Indiana.

25 (2) The individual served in an active or reserve component of
26 the armed forces of the United States or the Indiana National
27 Guard.

(3) The individual completed any required military occupational specialty training and was not discharged or separated from the armed forces or the Indiana National Guard under conditions [other than conditions set forth in IC 10-17-12-7.5(2)].

33 The definitions set forth in this subsection may not be construed to
34 affect a Hoosier veteran's eligibility for any state program that is based
35 upon a particular aspect of the Hoosier veteran's service such as a
36 disability or a wartime service requirement.

37 SECTION 2. IC 4-13-16.5-1, AS AMENDED BY P.L.238-2025,
38 SECTION 3, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
39 JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 1. (a) The definitions in this section apply

(b) "Commission" refers to the governor's commission on supplier diversity established under section 2 of this chapter.

39 other than conditions set forth in IE 10-17-12-7.5(2);

41 (2) is currently serving in:

(A) any branch of the armed forces of the United States or

(p) "Veteran owned small business" refers to a small business that:

(1) is independently owned and operated;

(2) is not dominant in its field of operation; and

(3) satisfies the criteria to be a veteran owned small business concern as specified in section 1.5 of this chapter.

(q) "Women's business enterprise" means a business that is one (1)

of the following:

(1) A sole proprietorship owned and controlled by a woman.

(2) A partnership or joint venture owned and controlled by women in which:

(A) at least fifty-one percent (51%) of the ownership is held by women; and

(B) the management and daily business operations are controlled by at least one (1) of the women who owns the

(3) A corporation or other entity:

(A) whose management and

controlled by at least one (1) of the women who owns the business; and

(B) that is at least fifty-one percent (51%) owned by women, or if stock is issued, at least fifty-one percent (51%) of the stock is owned by at least one (1) of the women.

(4) A qualified women's nonprofit corporation.

7 JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 15. (a) The facilities of the law enforcement
8 academy shall be available to any law enforcement agency of the state,

 12 board, including amounts needed to recoup corresponding marginal

 39 member's benefit. However, the additional service credit may be used
 40 only in the computation of benefits to be paid after the date of the
 41 board's determination, and the member is not entitled to a
 42 recomputation of benefits received before the date of the board's

7 (j) Subject to this section, an active member may purchase and
 8 claim not more than two (2) years of service credit for the member's
 9 service on active duty in the armed services if the member meets the
 10 following conditions:

11 (1) The member has at least one (1) year of credited service in
 12 the fund.
