Summary of Legislation: (Amended) The bill requires the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to study and issue a report on the following topics:

- (1) opportunities to leverage public land to improve public health outcomes;
- (2) options for a consistent visitor fee collection system at state fish and wildlife areas; and
- (3) a plan to mitigate and recover from natural disasters affecting public land.

Effective Date: July 1, 2026.

Explanation of State Expenditures: The bill will increase administrative workload for the DNR's Divisions of State Parks, Forestry, Fish and Wildlife, and Nature Preserves to study the topics in the bill and to issue a report, not later than November 1, 2027. The bill requires the DNR to use existing data, analyses, partnerships, and staff capacity to the greatest extent possible. The bill requires the DNR to use existing appropriations, federal funds, grants, and partnerships, without requiring additional state General Fund appropriations.

The bill allows the DNR to consult with the Indiana Department of Health, Indiana University School of Public Health, and Purdue University; therefore, workload for these entities could increase. These requirements should be able to be accomplished using existing resources.

Explanation of State Revenues:

Explanation of Local Expenditures: Local units and emergency management agencies may experience an increased workload to coordinate with the DNR regarding plans to mitigate the impacts of natural disasters on public lands.
