Synopsis: Immigration matters. Provides that if a law enforcement officer, governmental body, or postsecondary educational institution is made a party to a civil suit and the attorney general determines that the suit has arisen out of certain immigration matters, the attorney general may defend the law enforcement officer, the governmental body, or the

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postsecondary educational institution if representation is requested and the actions subject to the suit do not violate federal or state law. Provides that the prohibition on governmental bodies or postsecondary educational institutions limiting or restricting the enforcement of federal immigration law applies regardless of whether the enforcement related activity is carried out by a federal, state, or local law enforcement agency. Removes the mens rea standard in the statute concerning governmental bodies or postsecondary institutions violating the citizenship and immigration status information and enforcement of federal laws chapter. Provides that if the attorney general determines that probable cause exists that a governmental entity has not complied with certain requests, the attorney general may bring a court action to: (1) enjoin an act or practice constituting a violation; (2) impose a civil penalty for noncompliance; and (3) and obtain other such relief as is necessary. Provides that before bringing an action against a county jail for certain violations, the attorney general shall consult with the department of correction concerning the most recent inspection report and provide the county jail with notice of the attorney general's probable cause determination. Provides that a governmental body that has the custody of an individual who is the subject of an immigration detainer request shall: (1) provide the judge authorized to grant or deny the individual's release on bail notice that the individual is subject to an immigration detainer request; (2) record in the individual's case file that the individual is subject to an immigration detainer request; (3) comply with the immigration detainer request; and (4) inform the individual that the individual is being held pursuant to an immigration detainer request. Provides immunity to a governmental body or an employee of a governmental body for any action taken concerning an immigration detainer request as long as the action does not violate federal or civil law. Requires a judge who receives notice that an individual is subject to an immigration detainer request to ensure that the notice of the immigration detainer request is recorded in the court's record. Provides that the department of correction shall, in consultation with the attorney general, identify options for training concerning minimum standards for county jails. Provides that compliance with certain standards and the results of an inspection do not preclude and are not a defense to the attorney general bringing an action under IC 5-2-18.2. Provides that the department shall submit to the state budget committee status update reports. Requires the office of the secretary to submit a report to the legislative council concerning certain immigration matters. Provides that each hospital shall, not more than one hundred twenty (120) days after the end of each calendar quarter, file with the state department beginning January 1, 2027, in cases where Medicaid is the patient's payor, the form of identification, if any, used by the patient when the patient was admitted. Specifies that it is unlawful for an employer to knowingly or intentionally recruit, hire, or continue to employ an unauthorized alien in Indiana. Allows the attorney general to bring an enforcement action against an employer if the attorney general determines that probable cause exists that the employer has violated certain recruitment and hiring restrictions concerning an unauthorized alien. Prohibits an employer from discharging or discriminating against an employee because the employee communicated or cooperated with the attorney general. Provides that indecent nuisance means a place in which human trafficking is conducted and is not limited to a public place. Provides that a governmental entity that employs a prosecuting official is entitled to investigative costs, court costs, and reasonable attorney's fees incurred in an indecent nuisance action if the existence of an indecent nuisance is admitted or established in the action. Makes technical changes.

ENGROSSED SENATE BILL No. 76

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning state and local administration.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 4-6-2-1.5, AS AMENDED BY P.L.55-2025,
2 SECTION 1, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3 JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 1.5. (a) Whenever any state governmental official
4 or employee, whether elected or appointed, is made a party to a suit,
5 and the attorney general determines that said suit has arisen out of an
6 act which such official or employee in good faith believed to be within
7 the scope of the official's or employee's duties as prescribed by statute
8 or duly adopted regulation, the attorney general shall defend such
9 person throughout such action.
10 (b) Whenever a teacher (as defined in IC 20-18-2-22) is made a
11 party to a civil suit, and the attorney general determines that the suit
12 has arisen out of an act that the teacher in good faith believed was
13 within the scope of the teacher's duties in enforcing discipline policies
14 developed under IC 20-33-8-12, the attorney general shall defend the
15 teacher throughout the action.

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1 (c) Not later than July 30 of each year, the attorney general, in
 2 consultation with the Indiana education employment relations board
 3 established in IC 20-29-3-1, shall draft and disseminate a letter by
 4 electronic mail to the listed electronic mail address of teachers
 5 providing a summary of the teacher's rights and protections under state
 6 and federal law, including a teacher's rights and protections relating to
 7 the teacher's performance evaluation under IC 20-28-11.5.

8 (d) The department of education, in consultation with the Indiana
 9 education employment relations board, shall develop a method to
 10 provide the attorney general with the names and electronic mail
 11 addresses of active teachers in Indiana in order for the attorney general
 12 to disseminate the letter described in subsection (c). Names and
 13 electronic mail addresses collected and provided to the attorney general
 14 under this subsection are confidential and excepted from public
 15 disclosure as provided in IC 5-14-3-4.

16 (e) Whenever a school corporation (as defined in IC 20-26-2-4) is
 17 made a party to a civil suit and the attorney general determines that the
 18 suit has arisen out of an act authorized under IC 20-30-5-0.5 or
 19 IC 20-30-5-4.5, the attorney general shall defend the school corporation
 20 throughout the action.

21 **(f) Whenever a law enforcement officer (as defined in**
 22 **IC 5-2-18.2-2), governmental body (as defined in IC 5-2-18.2-1), or**
 23 **postsecondary educational institution (as defined in**
 24 **IC 5-2-18.2-2.2) is made a party to a civil suit and the attorney**
 25 **general determines that the suit has arisen out of an act authorized**
 26 **or required by IC 5-2-18.2, the attorney general may defend the**
 27 **law enforcement officer, governmental body, or postsecondary**
 28 **educational institution throughout the action if:**

29 (1) the entity has requested representation by the attorney
 30 general; and

31 (2) the actions subject to the suit do not violate federal or state
 32 law.

33 (g) As used in this subsection, "bridge authority" refers to the
 34 New Harmony and Wabash River bridge authority established by
 35 IC 8-16-15.5-2. Whenever:

36 (1) the bridge authority;

37 (2) a member of the bridge authority;

38 (3) an officer of the bridge authority; or

39 (4) an employee of the bridge authority;

40 is made a party to a civil suit and the attorney general determines that
 41 the suit has arisen out of an act or omission of any person described in
 42 subdivision (1), (2), (3), or (4), that is authorized or required under



1 IC 8-16-15.5 or any other law, the attorney general shall defend that
2 person throughout the action.

3 ~~(g)~~ **(h)** A determination by the attorney general under subsection (a),
4 (b), (e), ~~or~~ (f), **or (g)** shall not be admitted as evidence in the trial of
5 any such civil action for damages.

6 ~~(h)~~ **(i)** Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to deprive any such
7 person of the person's right to select counsel of the person's own choice
8 at the person's own expense.

9 SECTION 2. IC 5-2-18.2-0.5 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA
10 CODE AS A **NEW SECTION** TO READ AS FOLLOWS
11 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2026]: **Sec. 0.5. As used in this chapter,**
12 **"alien" has the meaning set forth in 8 U.S.C. 1101(a).**

13 SECTION 3. IC 5-2-18.2-1.7 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA
14 CODE AS A **NEW SECTION** TO READ AS FOLLOWS
15 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2026]: **Sec. 1.7. As used in this chapter,**
16 **"immigration detainer request" means a request issued by an**
17 **authorized immigration officer to a law enforcement agency to**
18 **detain an individual pursuant to 8 CFR 287.7 or any successor**
19 **provision or other applicable federal authority.**

20 SECTION 4. IC 5-2-18.2-3, AS AMENDED BY P.L.265-2017,
21 SECTION 2, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
22 JULY 1, 2026]: **Sec. 3. A governmental body or a postsecondary**
23 **educational institution may not enact or implement an ordinance, a**
24 **resolution, a rule, or a policy, *whether written or unwritten*, that**
25 **prohibits or in any way restricts another governmental body or**
26 **employee of a *governmental body or* postsecondary educational**
27 **institution, including a law enforcement officer, a state or local official,**
28 **or a state or local government employee, from taking the following**
29 **actions with regard to information of the citizenship or immigration**
30 **status, lawful or unlawful, of an individual:**

- 31 (1) Communicating or cooperating with federal officials.
32 (2) Sending to or receiving information from the United States
33 Department of Homeland Security.
34 (3) Maintaining information.
35 (4) Exchanging information with another federal, state, or local
36 government entity.
37 **(5) Gathering information as long as the request for**
38 **information does not conflict with applicable federal or state:**
39 **(A) law; or**
40 **(B) policy.**

41 SECTION 5. IC 5-2-18.2-4, AS AMENDED BY P.L.265-2017,
42 SECTION 3, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE



1 UPON PASSAGE]: Sec. 4. A governmental body or a postsecondary
 2 educational institution may not **in any way** limit or restrict the
 3 enforcement of federal immigration laws, **regardless of whether the**
 4 **enforcement related activity is carried out by a federal, state, or**
 5 **local law enforcement agency**, to less than the full extent permitted
 6 by federal law **as long as the enforcement actions do not violate**
 7 **federal or state law.**

8 SECTION 6. IC 5-2-18.2-5, AS AMENDED BY P.L.76-2024,
 9 SECTION 1, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 10 UPON PASSAGE]: Sec. 5. (a) If the attorney general determines that
 11 probable cause exists that a governmental body or a postsecondary
 12 educational institution has violated this chapter, the attorney general
 13 shall bring an action to compel the governmental body or
 14 postsecondary educational institution to comply with this chapter **and**
 15 **to seek the relief authorized under subsection (b).**

16 (b) **In an action brought under subsection (a), the attorney**
 17 **general may seek to:**

- 18 (1) **enjoin an act or a practice constituting a violation;**
- 19 (2) **impose a civil penalty of not more than ten thousand**
 20 **dollars (\$10,000) for each knowing or intentional violation;**
 21 **and**
- 22 (3) **obtain such other relief as is necessary to ensure future**
 23 **compliance with this chapter.**

24 (c) **In an action against a county jail for a violation of section 9**
 25 **of this chapter, the attorney general shall not impose a civil penalty**
 26 **if, during the most recent inspection under IC 11-12-4-2, the**
 27 **department of correction determines that the county jail was in**
 28 **compliance with standards promulgated by the department of**
 29 **correction pursuant to IC 11-12-4-1(a)(5).**

30 (d) **Before bringing an action against a county jail for a violation**
 31 **of section 9 of this chapter, the attorney general shall:**

- 32 (1) **consult with the department of correction in order to**
 33 **obtain the results of the most recent inspection of the county**
 34 **jail conducted pursuant to IC 11-12-4-2; and**
- 35 (2) **provide the county jail with notice of the attorney**
 36 **general's probable cause determination.**

37 **If, within thirty (30) days of receiving the notice, the county jail**
 38 **provides to the attorney general evidence that the county jail no**
 39 **longer engages in acts or practices that violate section 9 of this**
 40 **chapter, the attorney general may not initiate an action under**
 41 **subsection (a).**

42 (e) **The attorney general shall transfer all penalties collected**



1 **under this chapter to the treasurer of state for deposit in the state**
 2 **general fund.**

3 SECTION 7. IC 5-2-18.2-6, AS AMENDED BY P.L.76-2024,
 4 SECTION 2, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 5 UPON PASSAGE]: Sec. 6. If a court finds by a preponderance of the
 6 evidence that a governmental body or postsecondary educational
 7 institution ~~knowingly or intentionally~~ violated this chapter, the court
 8 shall enjoin the ~~violation.~~ **violation and grant other relief that is**
 9 **authorized for a violation under section 5(b) of this chapter.**

10 SECTION 8. IC 5-2-18.2-9 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
 11 AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
 12 1, 2026]: Sec. 9. (a) **Except as provided in subsection (b), a**
 13 **governmental body that has custody of an individual who is the**
 14 **subject of an immigration detainer request shall:**

15 (1) **provide to the judge authorized to grant or deny the**
 16 **individual's release on bail under IC 35-33-8-3.2 written**
 17 **notice that the individual is subject to an immigration**
 18 **detainer request;**

19 (2) **record in the individual's case file that the individual is**
 20 **subject to an immigration detainer request;**

21 (3) **comply with all requests made in the immigration detainer**
 22 **request; and**

23 (4) **inform the individual that the individual is being held**
 24 **pursuant to an immigration detainer request issued by an**
 25 **authorized immigration officer.**

26 (b) **An individual who is the subject of an immigration detainer**
 27 **request may challenge the immigration detainer request by**
 28 **claiming that:**

29 (1) **the individual has been misidentified and the correct**
 30 **subject of the immigration detainer request is not the**
 31 **individual; or**

32 (2) **the individual is a citizen of the United States and is not**
 33 **subject to removal.**

34 **After an individual makes either of these claims, the governmental**
 35 **body shall contact the authorized immigration officer to determine**
 36 **whether the individual has been misidentified or is a citizen of the**
 37 **United States.**

38 (c) **A governmental body or an employee of a governmental**
 39 **body is not criminally or civilly liable for any action taken in**
 40 **compliance with an immigration detainer request under this**
 41 **section as long as the action does not violate federal or state law.**

42 SECTION 9. IC 5-2-18.2-10 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE



1 AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
2 1, 2026]: **Sec. 10. A judge who receives written notice under section
3 9 of this chapter that an individual is subject to an immigration
4 detainer request shall ensure that the notice of the immigration
5 detainer request is recorded in the court's record, regardless of
6 whether the notice was received before or after a judgment in a
7 case.**

8 SECTION 10. IC 5-2-18.2-11 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA
9 CODE AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS
10 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2026]: **Sec. 11. The department of correction
11 shall, in consultation with the attorney general, identify options for
12 training concerning:**

- 13 (1) cooperation between county jails and the United States
14 Immigration and Customs Enforcement; and
15 (2) procedures for the implementation of section 9 of this
16 chapter.

17 SECTION 11. IC 11-8-11 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
18 AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
19 UPON PASSAGE]:

20 **Chapter 11. Miami Correctional Facility Reporting
21 Requirements**

22 **Sec. 1. For purposes of this chapter, "2025 agreement" refers to
23 the intergovernmental service 2025 agreement between ICE and
24 the Miami correctional facility that commences on September 30,
25 2025, and terminates on September 29, 2027.**

26 **Sec. 2. For purposes of this chapter, "ICE" means the United
27 States Department of Homeland Security, Immigration and
28 Customs Enforcement.**

29 **Sec. 3. For purposes of this chapter, "Miami correctional
30 facility" means the state correctional facility located in Miami
31 County.**

32 **Sec. 4. Before March 15, 2026, the department shall submit to
33 the state budget committee a status update report describing the
34 following:**

- 35 (1) The amount of money received after September 29, 2025,
36 and before March 1, 2026, by the state from ICE under the
37 2025 agreement related to Section 287(g) of the Immigration
38 and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1357(g)) with regard to the
39 Miami correctional facility or any other state facility covered
40 under the 2025 agreement.
41 (2) The amount of money expended after September 29, 2025,
42 and before March 1, 2026, by the department or any other



1 unit of state government on costs related to the housing and
 2 transportation of individuals, or other similar services, as
 3 described in the 2025 agreement.

4 (3) Any amendments or modifications to the 2025 agreement
 5 that occurred after September 29, 2025, and before March 1,
 6 2026.

7 **Sec. 5. Before April 15, 2026, and before the fifteenth day of**
 8 **each month thereafter through the termination of the 2025**
 9 **agreement, the department shall submit to the state budget**
 10 **committee a status update report describing the following:**

11 (1) The amount of money received during the previous month
 12 by the state from ICE under the 2025 agreement related to
 13 Section 287(g) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (8
 14 U.S.C. 1357(g)) with regard to the Miami correctional facility
 15 or any other state facility covered under the 2025 agreement.

16 (2) The amount of money expended during the previous
 17 month by the department or any other unit of state
 18 government on costs related to the housing and transportation
 19 of individuals, or other similar services, as described in the
 20 2025 agreement.

21 (3) Any amendments or modifications to the 2025 agreement
 22 that occurred during the previous month.

23 **Sec. 6. This chapter expires December 31, 2027.**

24 SECTION 12. IC 11-12-4-1, AS AMENDED BY P.L.56-2023,
 25 SECTION 82, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 26 JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 1. (a) The department shall adopt under IC 4-22-2
 27 minimum standards for county jails governing **the following:**

28 (1) General physical and environmental conditions.

29 (2) Services and programs to be provided to confined persons.

30 (3) Procedures for the care and control of confined persons that
 31 are necessary to ensure the health and safety of confined persons,
 32 the security of the jail, and public safety. ~~and~~

33 (4) The restraint of pregnant inmates. Rules adopted under this
 34 subdivision must be consistent with IC 11-10-3.5.

35 (5) **Procedures concerning proper cooperation between the**
 36 **jail and the United States Immigration and Customs**
 37 **Enforcement, including compliance with the requirements of**
 38 **IC 5-2-18.2-9.**

39 However, the department may not adopt any standard that prohibits the
 40 placement of more than one (1) prisoner in a prisoner cell that has
 41 thirty-five (35) square feet or more of floor space per prisoner.

42 (b) The standards must be sufficiently flexible to foster the



1 development of new and improved practices and to accommodate local
 2 needs and circumstances. The standards must be consistent with the
 3 laws of Indiana and the rules of the Indiana department of health and
 4 the fire prevention and building safety commission.

5 (c) The commissioner shall select a committee of not less than five
 6 (5) county sheriffs to consult with the department before and during the
 7 drafting of the proposed minimum standards. County sheriffs shall be
 8 selected from the various classes of counties to ensure that densely,
 9 moderately, and sparsely populated counties are represented. Each
 10 county sheriff is entitled to the minimum salary per diem as provided
 11 in IC 4-10-11-2.1 for each day engaged in the official business of the
 12 committee and to reimbursement for traveling and other expenses, as
 13 provided in the state travel policies and procedures established by the
 14 Indiana department of administration and approved by the budget
 15 agency.

16 (d) At least sixty (60) days before setting the date for a public
 17 hearing under IC 4-22-2, the department shall forward copies of the
 18 proposed minimum standards to each county ~~sheriff and sheriff~~, each
 19 board of county commissioners, **and the attorney general** and shall
 20 solicit their views and suggestions.

21 **(e) Compliance with standards described in subsection (a)(5)**
 22 **and the results of inspections performed pursuant to IC 11-12-4**
 23 **concerning compliance with such standards do not preclude and**
 24 **are not a defense to the attorney general bringing an action under**
 25 **IC 5-2-18.2 for violations of IC 5-2-18.2-9.**

26 SECTION 13. IC 11-12-4-2, AS AMENDED BY P.L.84-2016,
 27 SECTION 61, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 28 JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 2. (a) The department shall inspect each county
 29 jail at least one (1) time each year to determine whether it is complying
 30 with the standards adopted under section 1 of this chapter.

31 **(b) If the department determines that a jail is not complying with the**
 32 **standards, standards described in section 1(a)(1) through 1(a)(4) of**
 33 **this chapter,** the commissioner shall give written notice of this
 34 determination to the county sheriff, the board of county commissioners,
 35 the prosecuting attorney, the circuit court, superior court, or probate
 36 court, and all courts having criminal or juvenile jurisdiction in that
 37 county. This notice must specify which standards are not being met and
 38 state the commissioner's recommendations regarding compliance.

39 **(c) If the department determines that a jail is not complying**
 40 **with standards described in section 1(a)(5) of this chapter, the**
 41 **commissioner shall give written notice of this determination to the**
 42 **county sheriff and the attorney general.**

 17 injunctive relief.

(d) If a court determines that an employer has violated the terms of its probationary status under subsection (c), the court shall order the applicable relief provided in subsection (b).

(e) If an employer does not hold an operating authorization specific to the location at which a violation occurred, but uses other operating authorizations at other locations, the court shall, in ordering the relief provided under subsection (b), suspend or revoke those other operating authorizations.

Sec. 10. (a) An employer may not discharge or discriminate against an employee because the employee communicated or cooperated with the attorney general concerning compliance with this chapter.

(b) An employee who believes that the employee was discharged or discriminated against in violation of subsection (a) may, within thirty (30) calendar days after the violation occurs, file a complaint with the commissioner of labor. The complaint shall be handled as provided in IC 22-8-1.1-38.1.

Sec. 11. The suspension or revocation of a license under this chapter does not relieve an employer from the employer's obligations to withhold, collect, or pay income tax on wages paid to employees.

Sec. 12. This chapter shall be enforced without regard to race, color, or national origin."

If, within thirty (30) days of receiving the notice, the county jail provides to the attorney general sufficient evidence that the county

- (2) recommend, in writing, to the prosecuting attorney and each court with criminal or juvenile jurisdiction that a grand jury be convened to tour and examine the county jail under IC 35-34-2-11.

(e) Upon receipt of notice by the commissioner under subsection (b) that the jail does not comply with standards adopted under section 1 of this chapter, the sheriff may bring an action in the circuit court, superior court, or probate court against the board of county commissioners or county council for appropriate mandatory or injunctive relief."

(1) The amount of money received during the previous month by the state from ICE under the 2025 agreement related to Section 287(g) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1357(g)) with regard to the Miami correctional facility or any other state facility covered under the 2025 agreement.

(2) The amount of money expended during the previous month by the department or any other unit of state government on costs related to the housing and transportation of individuals, or other similar services, as described in the 2025 agreement.
