SENATE BILL No. 85

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning health.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 4-6-2-13 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
2 AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
3 1, 2026]: **Sec. 13. (a) The attorney general may enforce the**
4 **provisions concerning wage garnishment under IC 24-4.5-5-105**
5 **and principal residence liens and IC 32-28-16.**

6 **(b) The attorney general may bring any enforcement action**
7 **under IC 24-5-0.5-4. The attorney general shall establish a**
8 **complaint process for an aggrieved individual of the public to file**
9 **a complaint against a medical creditor or medical debt collector**
10 **that violates IC 24-4.5-5-105 or IC 32-28-16. A complaint filed**
11 **under this section is considered a public record under IC 5-14-3.**
12 **However, the attorney general shall redact the name, address, and**
13 **any personal identifying information of the complainant.**

14 SECTION 2. IC 16-18-2-52.5, AS AMENDED BY P.L.188-2025,
15 SECTION 3, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE

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1 JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 52.5. (a) "Charity care", for purposes of
 2 IC 16-21-6, **IC 16-21-6.1**, IC 16-21-9, and IC 16-40-6, means the
 3 unreimbursed cost to a hospital of providing, funding, or otherwise
 4 financially supporting health care services:

- 5 (1) to a person classified by the hospital as financially indigent
 6 or medically indigent on an inpatient or outpatient basis; and
 7 (2) to financially indigent patients through other nonprofit or
 8 public outpatient clinics, hospitals, or health care organizations.

9 (b) As used in this section, "financially indigent" means an
 10 uninsured or underinsured person who is accepted for care with no
 11 obligation or a discounted obligation to pay for the services rendered
 12 based on the hospital's financial criteria and procedure used to
 13 determine if a patient is eligible for charity care. The criteria and
 14 procedure must include income levels and means testing indexed to the
 15 federal poverty guidelines. A hospital may determine that a person is
 16 financially or medically indigent under the hospital's eligibility system
 17 after health care services are provided.

18 (c) As used in this section, "medically indigent" means a person
 19 whose medical or hospital bills after payment by third party payors
 20 exceed a specified percentage of the patient's annual gross income as
 21 determined in accordance with the hospital's eligibility system, and
 22 who is financially unable to pay the remaining bill.

23 SECTION 3. IC 16-21-6.1 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
 24 AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 25 JULY 1, 2026]:

26 **Chapter 6.1. Hospitals' Billing Practices and Financial
 27 Disclosures to Patients**

28 **Sec. 1. (a) This section applies to health care services provided
 29 to a person by a hospital after June 30, 2026.**

30 **(b) With respect to any bill that:**

- 31 **(1) is for a person that has either:**
 - 32 **(A) an income that is below four hundred percent
 33 (400%) of the federal income poverty level (as defined
 34 in IC 12-15-2-1); or**
 - 35 **(B) a total bill that is greater than ten percent (10%) of
 36 the person's gross monthly household income;**

- 37 **(2) includes charges for health care services provided to a
 38 person by a hospital; and**

- 39 **(3) is submitted to that person for payment;**

40 **a hospital shall offer the person the opportunity to pay the listed
 41 charges through a payment plan that satisfies the requirements set
 42 forth in this section.**



(c) A hospital's offer under subsection (b) must:

- (1) be in writing and communicated in plain language;
- (2) include instructions for how the person may enter into a payment plan; and
- (3) if the offer is included in the bill for the charges to which the offer pertains, be printed in prominent type on the front of the first page of the bill.

(d) A hospital may provide a person the offer required by subsection (b);

(1) in a writing delivered to the person;

(2) by electronic mail; or

(3) through a mobile application or another Internet based method, if available;

according to the person's expressed preference for communications.

(e) If a person accepts a hospital's offer to enter into a payment plan under this section, the hospital shall provide, in the manner described in subsection (d), a written copy of the payment plan to the person not later than five (5) business days after the payment plan is executed by both parties. The plan must prominently disclose:

(1) the rate of any interest that will be applied to unpaid balances under the plan; and

(2) the date by which the account will be paid in full, assuming that all scheduled payments will be made when due.

A person is not required to make a payment under the payment plan until a written copy of the payment plan has been provided to the person under this section in the manner described in subsection (d).

(f) A hospital's payment plan under this section must satisfy the following:

(1) The payment plan must allow payments to be made over a period of at least twenty-four (24) months.

(2) The amount of any one (1) monthly payment may not exceed ten percent (10%) of the person's gross monthly household income.

(3) The first payment under the plan may not be due before thirty (30) days have elapsed from the latest date of service for the health care services to which the payment plan pertains.

(4) Payments under the plan must be suspended without



penalty during the pendency of any appeal by the person for the denial of insurance or other third party coverage for the health care services to which the payment plan pertains if the patient provides the hospital with documentation of the appeal. Payments under the plan may resume after sixty (60) days from the date the hospital receives documentation of the appeal unless the patient provides additional documentation concerning the pending appeal.

31 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 7. (a) Each nonprofit hospital shall
32 prepare an annual report of the community benefits plan. The report
33 must include, in addition to the community benefits plan itself, the
34 following background information:

35 (1) The hospital's mission statement.

36 (2) A disclosure of the health care needs of the community that
37 were considered in developing the hospital's community benefits
38 plan.

39 (3) A disclosure of the amount and types of community benefits
40 actually provided, including charity care. Charity care must be
41 reported as a separate item from other community benefits.

42 (b) Each nonprofit hospital shall annually file a report of the

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1 community benefits plan with the state department. For a hospital's
 2 fiscal year that ends before July 1, 2011, the report must be filed not
 3 later than one hundred twenty (120) days after the close of the

10 (c) Each nonprofit hospital shall prepare a statement that notifies
 11 the public that the annual report of the community benefits plan is:

- 12 (1) public information;

- 14 (3) available to the public on request from the state department.

15 This statement shall be posted in prominent places throughout the
 16 hospital, including the emergency room waiting area and the
 17 admissions office waiting area. The statement shall also be printed in
 18 the hospital patient guide or other material that provides the patient
 19 with information about the admissions criteria of the hospital.

(e) "support withholding" means that part of the earnings that are withheld from an individual for child support in accordance with the laws of this state.

(a) An amount equal to twenty-five percent (25%) of the individual's disposable earnings for that week or, upon a showing of good cause by the individual why the amount should be reduced, an amount equal to:

- (i) less than twenty-five percent (25%); and
- (ii) at least ten percent (10%);

of the individual's disposable earnings for that week.

(b) The amount by which the individual's disposable earnings for that week exceed thirty (30) times the federal minimum hourly wage prescribed by 29 U.S.C. 206(a)(1) in effect at the time the earnings are payable.

In the case of earnings for a pay period other than a week, the earnings shall be computed upon a multiple of the federal minimum hourly wage equivalent to thirty (30) times the federal minimum hourly wage as prescribed in this section.

6 or dependent child (other than a spouse or child with respect to
7 whose support such order is used), fifty percent (50%) of such
8 individual's disposable earnings for that week; and
9 (b) where such individual is not supporting such a spouse or

(5) An employer who is required to make deductions from an individual's disposable earnings pursuant to a garnishment order or series of orders arising out of the same judgment debt (excluding a judgment for payment of child support) may collect, as a fee to compensate the employer for making these deductions, an amount equal to the greater of twelve dollars (\$12) or three percent (3%) of the total amount required to be deducted by the garnishment order or series of orders arising out of the same judgment debt. If the employer chooses to impose a fee, the fee shall be allocated as follows:

34 (b) One-half (1/2) of the fee shall be borne by the creditor, and
35 that amount may be retained by the employer from the amount
36 otherwise due the creditor.

37 The deductions made under this subsection for a collection fee do not
38 increase the amount of the judgment debt for which the fee is collected
39 for the purposes of calculating the collection fee limit. This fee

37 The deductions made under this subsection for a collection fee do not
38 increase the amount of the judgment debt for which the fee is collected
39 for the purpose of calculating or collecting judgment interest. This fee
40 may be collected by an employer only once for each garnishment order
41 or series of orders arising out of the same judgment debt. The employer



1 may collect the entire fee from one (1) or more of the initial deductions
 2 from the employee's disposable earnings. Alternatively, the employer
 3 may collect the fee ratably over the number of pay periods during
 4 which deductions from the employee's disposable earnings are
 5 required.

6 (6) The deduction of the garnishment collection fee under
 7 subsection (5)(a) or subsection (7) is not an assignment of wages under
 8 IC 22-2-6.

9 (7) An employer who is required to make a deduction from an
 10 individual's disposable earnings in accordance with a judgment for
 11 payment of child support may collect a fee of two dollars (\$2) each
 12 time the employer is required to make the deduction. The fee may be
 13 deducted by the employer from the individual's disposable earnings
 14 each time the employer makes the deduction for support. If the
 15 employer elects to deduct such a fee, the amount to be deducted for the
 16 payment of support must be reduced accordingly if necessary to avoid
 17 exceeding the maximum amount permitted to be deducted under
 18 subsection (3).

19 (8) A support withholding order takes priority over a garnishment
 20 order irrespective of their dates of entry or activation. If a person is
 21 subject to a support withholding order and a garnishment order, the
 22 garnishment order shall be honored only to the extent that disposable
 23 earnings withheld under the support withholding order do not exceed
 24 the maximum amount subject to garnishment as computed under
 25 subsection (2).

26 **(9) For health care debt, the maximum part of the aggregate
 27 disposable earnings of an individual for any workweek which is
 28 subjected to garnishment to enforce the payment of one (1) or more
 29 judgments against the individual concerning health care debt may
 30 not exceed the following amounts:**

- 31 **(a) For an individual who earns two hundred percent (200%)
 32 or less of the federal income poverty level, zero dollars (\$0).**
- 33 **(b) For an individual who earns above two hundred percent
 34 (200%) of the federal income poverty level, not more than
 35 ten percent (10%) of the individual's disposable earnings for
 36 that week that are above the two hundred percent (200%) of
 37 the federal income poverty level.**

7 **Sec. 2. (a) As used in this chapter, "health care debt" means an**
 8 **obligation or an alleged obligation of a consumer to pay an amount**
 9 **related to the receipt of medically necessary (as defined in**
 10 **IC 27-1-37.5-5.4) health care services, products, or devices**
 11 **provided to a person by a health care provider.**

12 **(b) The term does not include Medicaid expenses subject to**
 13 **recovery under IC 12-15 or debt charged to a credit card unless the**
 14 **credit card is issued under:**

15 **(1) an open-end plan; or**
 16 **(2) a closed-end plan;**

17 **offered specifically for the payment of health care services,**
 18 **products, or devices provided to a person.**

1 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE UPON PASSAGE]: Sec. 1. **(a) Except as**
 2 **provided in subsection (b)**, the following real estate is liable to all
 3 judgments and attachments and to be sold on execution against the
 4 debtor ~~owing~~ **owning** the real estate or for whose use the real estate is
 5 held:

6 (1) All lands of the judgment debtor, whether in possession,
 7 remainder, or reversion.
 8 (2) All rights of redeeming mortgaged lands and all lands held
 9 by virtue of any land office certificate.
 10 (3) Lands or any estate or interest in land held by anyone in trust
 11 for or to the use of another.
 12 (4) All chattels real of the judgment debtor.

 19 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE UPON PASSAGE]: Sec. 2. **(a) Except as**
 20 **provided in subsection (b)**, all final judgments for the recovery of
 21 money or costs in the circuit court and other courts of record of general
 22 original jurisdiction in Indiana, whether state or federal, constitute a
 23 lien upon real estate and chattels real liable to execution in the county
 24 where the judgment has been duly entered and indexed in the judgment
 25 docket as provided by law:

26 (1) after the time the judgment was entered and indexed; and
 27 (2) until the expiration of ten (10) years after the rendition of the
 28 judgment;

29 exclusive of any time during which the party was restrained from
 30 proceeding on the lien by an appeal, an injunction, the death of the
 31 defendant, or the agreement of the parties entered of record.

32 **(b) A final judgment for the recovery of money or costs in any**
 33 **action filed, in a court of competent jurisdiction in Indiana, for the**
 34 **recovery of health care debt owed or alleged to be owed by a**
 35 **consumer does not constitute a lien upon the principal residence of**
 36 **the consumer.**
