DIGEST OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Initial practitioner license. Reinstates language requiring that an individual must hold a bachelor's degree in science, technology, engineering, or mathematics as a component of certain pathways to receive an initial practitioner license.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning education.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 20-28-3-1, AS AMENDED BY P.L.190-2025,
2 SECTION 3, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3 JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 1. (a) As used in this section, "teacher candidate"
4 means an individual recommended for an initial teaching license from
5 a teacher preparation program located in Indiana.
6 (b) As used in this section, "teacher preparation program"
7 includes, but is not limited to, the following:
8 (1) A teacher education school or department.
9 (2) A transition to teaching program under IC 20-28-4.
10 (3) Any other entity approved by the department to offer a course
11 of study leading to an initial teaching license.
12 (c) The department shall:
13 (1) arrange a statewide system of professional instruction for
14 teacher education;
15 (2) accredit and review teacher preparation programs that
16 comply with the rules of the department;
17 (3) approve content area licensure programs for particular kinds
18 of teachers in accredited teacher preparation programs; and
19 (4) specify the types of licenses for individuals who complete

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1 programs of approved courses.

2 (d) The department shall work with teacher preparation programs
3 to develop a system of teacher education that ensures individuals who
4 complete teacher preparation programs are able to meet the highest
5 professional standards.

12 (f) The standards established under subsection (e) must include
13 benchmarks for performance, including test score data for each teacher
14 preparation entity on content area licensure tests and test score data for
15 each teacher preparation entity on pedagogy licensure tests.

16 (g) Each teacher preparation program shall annually report the
17 program's performance on the standards and benchmarks established
18 under this section to the department. The department shall make the
19 information reported under this subsection available to the public on
20 the department's website. Each teacher preparation program shall make
21 the information reported under this subsection available to the public
22 on the teacher preparation program's website. In addition to reporting
23 performance, each teacher preparation program must report to the
24 department the following:

25 (1) The attrition, retention, and completion rates of teacher
26 candidates for the previous three (3) calendar years. The teacher
27 preparation program must also provide underlying data, as
28 determined by the department, used as part of calculating the
29 teacher preparation program's retention rates.

30 (2) The number of teacher candidates in each content area who
31 complete the teacher preparation program during the year,
32 disaggregated by ranges of cumulative grade point averages.

33 (3) The number of teacher candidates in each content area who,
34 during the year:

35 (A) do not pass a content area licensure examination; and
36 (B) do not retake the content area licensure examination.
37 (h) In making information available to the public on the
38 department's website, the department shall include in the report under
39 subsection (g), in addition to the matrix ratings described in subsection
40 (i), the following information:

(1) Average scaled or standard scores of teacher candidates who complete teacher preparation programs on basic skills, content

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area, and pedagogy licensure examinations.

(2) The average number of times teacher candidates who complete a teacher preparation program take each licensing test before receiving a passing score and the percentage of teacher candidates who receive a passing score on each licensing test on the teacher candidates' first attempts.

(i) Not later than July 30, 2016, the department and the commission for higher education, in conjunction with the state board, the Independent Colleges of Indiana, Inc., and teacher preparation programs, shall establish a matrix rating system for teacher preparation programs based on the performance of the programs as demonstrated by the data collected under subsections (g) and (h). The matrix rating system must be based on data collected for teachers who initially receive their teaching license during the previous three (3) years. The department shall make the matrix ratings available to the public on the department's website.

(j) Each teacher preparation program shall report to the department, in a manner prescribed by the department, the teacher preparation program's admission practices, in accordance with:

(1) the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation standards, for teacher preparation programs accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation;

(2) rigorous academic entry requirements for admission into a teacher preparatory program that are equivalent to the minimum academic requirements determined by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation; for teacher preparation programs that are not accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation; or

(3) the Association for Advancing Quality in Educator Preparation standards, for teacher preparation programs accredited by the Association for Advancing Quality in Educator Preparation; or

(3) rigorous academic entry requirements for admission into a teacher preparatory program that are comparable to the minimum academic requirements determined by the:

(A) Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation; or

(B) Association for Advancing Quality in Educator Preparation;

for teacher preparation programs that are accredited by another accrediting agency approved by the department.

The department shall include information reported to the department



1 on the department's website.

2 (k) Not later than July 30, 2016, the department and the
 3 commission for higher education, in conjunction with the state board,
 4 the Independent Colleges of Indiana, Inc., and teacher preparation
 5 programs, shall establish a minimum rating under the matrix rating
 6 system established under subsection (i) that teacher preparation
 7 programs must achieve to avoid referral under subsection (l).

8 (l) Not later than July 1 of each year, the department shall submit
 9 a list of teacher preparation programs that do not meet the minimum
 10 rating established under subsection (k) or the requirements of section
 11 3.1 or 3.2 of this chapter to the commission for higher education and
 12 the Independent Colleges of Indiana, Inc. for one (1) of the following
 13 actions:

14 (1) In the case of a state educational institution, the commission
 15 for higher education shall place the teacher preparation program
 16 on an improvement plan with clear performance goals and a
 17 designated period in which the performance goals must be
 18 achieved.

19 (2) In the case of a proprietary postsecondary educational
 20 institution, the commission for higher education shall
 21 recommend to the teacher preparation program an improvement
 22 plan with clear performance goals and a designated period in
 23 which the performance goals should be achieved.

24 (3) In the case of a nonprofit college or university, the
 25 Independent Colleges of Indiana, Inc., shall coordinate a peer
 26 review process to make recommendations to the peer institution
 27 in achieving the department's performance metrics.

28 (m) The department shall approve at least two (2) accreditors that
 29 ~~(1) accredit teacher preparation programs and~~
 30 ~~(2) are recognized by the Council for Higher Education~~
 31 ~~Accreditation;~~

32 to accredit teacher preparation programs for use in Indiana.

33 (n) Not later than December 31, 2024, the department and the
 34 commission for higher education, in conjunction with the state board,
 35 shall partner with teacher preparation programs to receive an outside
 36 evaluation by a nationally recognized nonprofit, nonpartisan
 37 organization that leverages evidence based approaches on the science
 38 of reading to evaluate teacher preparation reading instruction programs.

 13 individual to teach in a charter school while the individual is in the
 14 process of obtaining the license.

15 **(c) Subject to subsection (d), if an individual who has obtained**
 16 **a license under this section receives an annual evaluation of**
 17 **effective or highly effective under IC 20-25-13 for not less than two**
 18 **(2) consecutive years, the individual shall be eligible to obtain an**
 19 **initial practitioner license for the content area in which the**
 20 **individual has taught.**

21 **(d) An individual eligible to obtain an initial practitioner**
 22 **license under subsection (c) must:**

23 **(1) demonstrate proficiency through a written examination,**
 24 **as described in section 12(b)(2) of this chapter, in the**

 26 **seeking an initial practitioner license; and**

(2) The results of an evaluation conducted under IC 20-28-11.5.

(3) The assignment of instructional leadership roles, including the responsibility for conducting evaluations under IC 20-28-11.5.

(4) The academic needs of students in the school corporation, including employment in a high need area such as those identified under IC 20-29-3-15(b)(27). This factor may not:

(A) account for less than ten percent (10%) of the calculation used to determine a teacher's increase or increment;

(B) apply to all eligible teachers in a bargaining unit uniformly; or

(C) be based on any other factor under this subsection.

16 (c) To provide greater flexibility and options, a school corporation
17 may further differentiate the amount of salary increases or increments
18 determined for teachers. A school corporation shall base a
19 differentiated amount under this subsection on reasons the school
20 corporation determines are appropriate, which may include the:

(1) subject or subjects taught by a given teacher;

(2) importance of retaining a given teacher at the school corporation;

(3) need to attract an individual with specific qualifications to fill a teaching vacancy; and

(4) offering of a new program or class.
