### SB 1003 (Eggman) - Trauma-Informed Care Training Program

**Version:** March 8, 2022

**Urgency:** No

**Hearing Date:** April 18, 2022

**Policy Vote:** HEALTH 11 - 0

**Bill Summary:** Senate Bill 1003 would require the Department of Public Health (CDPH) to establish a Trauma-Informed Care (TIC) training program, which would approve TIC providers, as specified, and certify TIC training courses.

**Fiscal Impact:** Staff notes unknown, significant costs (hundreds of thousands to low million, General Fund). The range reflects various implementation approaches. If CDPH were to contract with the California Office of Emergency Services (CalOES), state operations costs would be lower and would depend on whether CDPH would need to contract with external subject matter experts (potentially low hundreds of thousands). However, if CDPH were to establish its own program, CDPH may need to hire staff to develop and establish a training curriculum and criteria for certifying providers, oversee and review applications, and incur automation costs related to notifying providers of certification expiration.

**Background:** Various California agencies and departments establish training and licensing and certification standards, in order to protect, and uphold, the safety and health of its providers in their communities. The CalOES conducts emergency recovery activities, including administering California Disaster Assistance Act (CDAA) grants to local governments for various disaster-related purposes. In addition, CalOES administers various state and federal grant programs and a statewide victim-assistance training program. The CDPH's former Safe and Active Communities Branch was renamed the Injury and Violence Branch and includes an initiative to reduce violence and create safer and healthier communities for all Californians.

**Proposed Law:** SB 1003 would require the CDPH to establish the Trauma-Informed Care Training Program, for the purpose of approving Trauma-Informed Care Training providers and certifying training programs. Under the bill, CDPH must:

- Approve state or local agencies, nonprofit organizations, or educational institutions with demonstrated expertise and experience working with victims of violent crime and mass casualty events or providing trauma-informed training as providers of Trauma-Informed Care Training.
- Approve and certify all Trauma- Informed Care Training courses that meet specified criteria.

**Related Legislation:** AB 1384 (Weber, Chapter 587, Statutes of 2017) recognized the trauma recovery center (TRC) at San Francisco General Hospital as the State Pilot TRC.
