AB 1602 (Blanca Rubio) - Foster youth: disaster aid assistance

Bill Summary: AB 1602 would create the Child Welfare Disaster Response Program.

Fiscal Impact:

- Unknown ongoing General Fund costs, potentially low millions, to fund the proposed Child Welfare Disaster Response Account.
- The California Department of Social Services (CDSS) anticipates minor and absorbable costs for state administration.

Background: CDSS oversees a system of child welfare services, including foster care, for children who have been adjudged by the court to be at risk of abuse and neglect or who have been abused or neglected, as specified. Counties are required to update and maintain Child Welfare Services Disaster Response Plans that describe the responsibilities and actions required for locating and monitoring dependent and probationary children. Disaster response plans include procedures describing how the county will do the following:

- Identify, locate, and continue availability of services for CWS children, probation children, non-minor dependents, including non-minor dependents residing in foster care, out-of-county placements, children placed in or out of California through the Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children, cross coordination with Tribal representative for Indian children in placements, and out-of-state non-minor dependents under county care or supervision who are displaced or adversely affected by a disaster;
- Respond appropriately to new CWS cases in areas adversely affected by a disaster and provide services in those cases;
- Address and provide care for unaccompanied minors;
- Remain in communication with caseworkers and other essential child welfare personnel who are displaced because of a disaster;
- Preserve essential program records; and
- Coordinate services and share information with other states and counties.

CDSS's Child Welfare Services Disaster Planning and Response Unit (DPRU) was created in 2021 to provide additional support during disasters to child welfare and

probation agencies across the state. The DPRU collaborates with all 58 counties to establish processes for making, activating, and operating emergency and disaster preparedness plans relating to children in placements under state care, from probation to foster care, to out-of-county placements. The DPRU has outlined four emergency management phases: preparedness, response, recovery and mitigation.

Proposed Law: Specific provisions of the bill would:

- Create the Child Welfare Disaster Response Program to be administered by the CDSS and create the Child Welfare Disaster Response Account to fund the program.
- Require, upon appropriation by the Legislature, moneys in the Child Welfare Disaster Response Account to be used for purposes of the program and to support the needs of foster children and youth and their caregivers during a disaster.
- Provide that a county child welfare agency, county probation department, or Indian tribe as described, may apply for funds on behalf of foster children and youth and their caregivers based on the eligibility criteria established by the CDSS.
- Require that funds awarded be available to meet the housing, clothing, transportation, and other tangible needs of foster children and youth and their caregivers that occur within 180 days of a local emergency proclamation by a local government or a state of emergency proclamation by the Governor.
- State the intent of the Legislature that the Child Welfare Disaster Response Account may be replenished at the start of every fiscal year.
- Provide that gifts, donations, and bequests may be made to the Child Welfare Disaster Response Account, subject to any conditions or restrictions from the CDSS.

Related Legislation: AB 689 (Rubio, 2025) was identical to this bill. The bill was vetoed by the Governor.

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
