SUBJECT: State parks: parks passes: libraries

SOURCE: California State Parks Foundation

DIGEST: This bill authorizes the Department of Parks and Recreation to work with the California State Library and individual library systems to provide passes to state park units.

ANALYSIS:

Existing Law:

- 1) Establishes the California state park system and vests State Parks with control of the state park system and responsibility for administering, protecting, developing, and interpreting state parks for the use and enjoyment of the public. Requires State Parks to protect the state park system from damage and to preserve the peace therein (Public Resources Code (PRC) § 5001 *et seq.*).
- 2) Limits attendance at the state park system to within limits established by carrying capacity (PRC §§ 5001.96, 5019.5).

- 3) Authorizes State Parks to collect fees, rents, and returns for use of any state park system area with some exceptions, including:
 - a) Prohibits State Parks from collecting any fee from students in kindergarten through 12th grade on a school outing (PRC § 5010.2);
 - b) Authorizes State Parks to provide discounted passes to certain groups of people including fourth graders, seniors over the age of 62, disabled persons, and low-income residents, as defined (PRC §§ 5010.2.5, 5011); and
 - c) Authorizes State Parks to issue a reduced fee or free day use permit to veterans, active-duty military, and reserve military personnel on Memorial Day and Veterans Day (PRC § 5011.6).

This bill:

- 1) Codifies findings and declarations that:
 - a) It is the policy of the state to ensure equitable and inclusive access to the state park system by empowering State Parks to administer programs that broaden public access to the state parks.
 - b) The state park system provides a host of important values to the residents of California, including recreational, cultural, environmental, and public health benefits.
 - c) The current fee structures to enter a unit of the state park system create financial barriers that limit access for many residents.
 - d) It is imperative that State Parks support comprehensive access to the state parks for all residents of California.
- 2) Authorizes State Parks to work with the California State Library and individual library systems to provide passes to state park units.

Background

California State Park System. According to the Department of Parks and Recreation (State Parks), the State Park System consists of 280 state park units, over 340 miles of coastline, 970 miles of lake and river frontage, 15,000 campsites, 5,200 miles of trails, 3,195 historic buildings, and more than 11,000 known prehistoric and historic archaeological sites; the largest and most diverse

recreational, natural, and cultural heritage holdings of any state agency in the nation. More than 68 million people annually visit California's State Park System.

Reduced Rate or Free State Parks Passes. State Parks offers a number of annual passes to the general public for a fee. There are five passes offering free or discounted entry to State Park units on an annual or per-visit basis:

- Adventure Pass – offers free entry to 54 state parks to fourth graders and their families, valid for September 1 to August 31 of the child's fourth grade year.
- Disabled Discount Pass – for \$3.50, offers a lifetime pass to persons with permanent disabilities entitling the bearer to a 50% discount on vehicle day use, family camping, and boat-use fees at over 100 park units.
- Distinguished Veterans Pass – offers a free lifetime pass for vehicle day use, family camping, and boat use at over 100 park units to veterans meeting certain criteria.
 - Veterans and active-duty military can also receive a reduced fee or free day use at state parks units operated by the state and accessible with a vehicle day use annual pass on Memorial Day and Veterans Day (Public Resources Code (PRC) §5011.6).
- Golden Bear Pass - offers social services recipients and low-income seniors a pass for free vehicle day use access, valid for a calendar year.
- Senior Golden Bear Pass – for \$20, offers individuals 62 and over with free entry to many state parks during non-peak seasons, valid for a calendar year.

There are two “full price” annual state parks passes.

- The Explorer Vehicle Day Use Annual Pass is valid for one year and provides vehicle entrance to 134 state parks for \$195.
- The Golden Poppy Vehicle Day Use Annual Pass is valid for one year and provides vehicle entrance to 112 state parks for \$125.

Library Parks Pass Program. The California Library State Parks Pass Program was a pilot program launched in 2021 as a partnership between the First Partner's Office, State Parks, and the State Library.

Outdoors for All Initiative. The Administration of Governor Gavin Newsom established the Outdoors for All Initiative to enable equitable access to nature and the outdoors in order to advance the Governor's commitment to building a California for All. The Outdoors for All strategy calls for a future where everyone can experience and benefit from California's incredible outdoor spaces. This bill would help further the goals of the initiative.

- Forgone revenues (State Park and Recreation Fund [SPRF]) and cost pressures (General Fund or special fund) of an unknown but significant amount, likely in the low millions of dollars, for State Parks to provide vehicle day-use annual passes to support the State Library Parks Pass Program.
